Background

Regionally, over the last decade Asia has suffered the greatest number of disasters with 80% of the global death toll. Natural hazards have a major impact on children and youth and education systems. Studies of disaster trends and the likely consequences of climate change suggest that each year 175 million children are likely to be affected by natural hazard related disasters alone.1

Worldwide, approximately 1.2 billion students are enrolled in primary and secondary school; of these, 875 million school children live in high seismic risk zones and hundreds of millions more face regular flood, landslide, extreme wind and fire hazards. Although these children spend 25 to 50 percent of their waking hours in school facilities, all too often schools are not constructed or maintained to be disaster resilient. The death of children and adults in these schools causes irreplaceable loss to families, communities and countries and lifelong injury to millions of children around the world.²

Asian Coalition for School Safety (ACSS) and Children in a Changing Climate Coalition (CCCC) are promoting the Comprehensive School Safety Framework (CSS) to reduce risks from all hazards to the education sector.

The goals of comprehensive school safety³ are:

- To protect learners and education workers from death, injury, and harm in schools.
- To plan for educational continuity in the face of all expected hazards and threats.
- To safeguard education sector investments.
- To strengthen risk reduction and resilience through education.

Key messages to promote Safe Schools:

As of 2016: At least 10 Lead countries will commit to:

- · Every new school facility will be safe from known hazards. [P1]*
- National education authority will have a national level committee and full time focal point leading comprehensive school safety: safe school facilities, school disaster management and disaster risk reduction and resilience education. [P1,2,3]*

AS OF 2030: All signatory countries agree that:

- Every school facility (both new and existing) will be safe from known hazards. [P1]*
- National education authorities will lead implementation of common approach to school disaster management (policies, mechanisms and guidance) for ongoing participatory risk assessment, risk reduction, response preparedness, and educational continuity planning at all levels of the education sector. [P2]
- · School management will incorporate risk reduction and resiliency knowledge skills and competencies. [P2]
- Set of Key action-oriented messages for DRR/CCA, and skills and competencies for risk reduction and resilience are adopted at national level and integrated into formal school curriculum at all levels of the education sector, with leadership capacity in teacher training institutes, and supported with quality learning materials. [P3]*
- Quality basic education will include knowledge and skills for risk reduction and resiliency. [P3]*

Safe schools are a shared responsibility where it can only be done through the support from the national and local governments, private sectors, NGOs, media, and community.
