The APYN consists of National Society youth focal points, including both youth volunteers and National Society staff. Divided into four functional sub-regional youth networks, its supporting entity is made up of 4 steering committee (SC) members and 8 coordination committee (CC) members representing each of four regions. It is partly supported by IFRC secretariat in Asia Pacific.








APYN: Strategic Functions







Regional Thematic Humanitarian Priorities (2015-2016)

- 1. DRR and School safety
- 2. Climate Change Advocacy
- 3. Gender and Diversity
- Mutual Understanding (contributing to a culture of mutualunderstanding/non-violence and peace)
- 5. School Safety
- 6. Youth Leadership
- Contributing to community consultation = Beneficiary communication
- 8. Coordinating learning and training opportunity



APYN Plan of Action (2015 – 2016)

- 1. Create **an open-space discussion platform** to facilitate active communication, sharing, and voice collection for the grassroots youth and contribute to *the One Billion Coalition* for Resilience.
- 2. Capture and document Youth-led initiatives and success stories
- 3. Conduct Webinars for learning / capacity building opportunities for youth
- 4. Each sub-regions to work on the commonly shared issue/topic and as a collective effort contribute in a positive change
- 5. Develop a **pool of Youth Mentors and facilitate the mentoring system** for Youth
- 6. Develop a **Community of Practice on thematic areas** which are in high interest for Youth leaders and facilitate the connection of each CoP with existing networks and groups in the movement
- 7. Youth Development/ Engagement Benchmarking to be developed, followed by and regular monitoring system and facilitation of peer-to-peer support

- 3-4. To assign inter-network liaison member from SC/CC to other youth networks (ex. European Youth Network) to be better connected, to exchange update and to learn best practices and bring back the information to APYN SC/CC.
