


## **Preparing for disaster:**




Like we always practice at home you already know my phone number, our home address, and you know how to reach your granny, uncle and auntie if you can't reach me. Your school will also help keep you safe.







































Below are some key messages to remember about protecting boys and girls in disasters. Study these well, these tips could make all the difference for you and your family!
