Project Description: Supported by DFATD/GAC and CRC funding, the C3R Project seeks to reduce the impact of natural disasters on vulnerable communities in Southeast Asia. The \$6.45 million, 3.5-year project will strengthen the capacity of eleven SEA National Societies and regional structures to represent and communicate the needs of vulnerable groups, particularly women, boys and girls. The SEA National Societies, supported by the IFRC SEA Regional Delegation (SEARD) will work with national governments and regional organizations to advocate for disaster risk reduction (DRR) laws and policies that incorporate and consider issues related to vulnerable communities, gender equality, and the environment. The project will also build cooperation among SEA National Societies and regional DRR mechanisms, such as those of the Association of SEA Nations (ASEAN), to improve DRR at the regional level.

Ultimate Outcome: Reduced vulnerability to natural disasters for vulnerable communities in SEA, with emphasis on women, boys and girls.

Intermediate Outcomes:

- **1.** Improved representation of community DRR issues in national policies, plans, and programs.
- 2. Increased effectiveness of SEA regional DRR cooperation mechanisms that address the needs of vulnerable communities.

1 Executive Summary

The 'Building Regional Capacity and Collaboration for Community Resilience in Southeast Asia: Reducing the Impact of Disasters on Vulnerable Communities' project, henceforth referred to as the C3R Project¹, is a collaborative undertaking between the Canadian Red Cross (CRC), 11 Southeast Asia (SEA) Red Cross Red Crescent (RCRC) National Societies and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC). The C3R Project officially commenced on November 26, 2013, with the signing of the Project Contribution Agreement. The current agreement terminates on December 31, 2018.

This document presents the fifth Annual Workplan (AWP5) of the project, which outlines the key areas to be supported under the no-cost extension (NCE) of the Regional Resilience Initiative (RRI) approved by GAC at the end of March 2018. Initial discussions between GAC, Canadian RC and IFRC in late 2017 envisioned the main assumptions for planning while a short consultative process was conducted in April 2018 with National Societies in Southeast Asia as well as relevant technical partners, allowing for detailed activities and timeframes to be identified. The plan was prepared concurrent to the Project Implementation Plan (PIP) and has a follow-up of the AWP4, thus only the changes in the operating environment or the proposed program of work (e.g., the gender and environmental strategies, Logic Model, Work Breakdown Structure, Risk Matrix, project management structure, etc.) are presented here.

At the time of planning for this extended period of implementation, the following key assumptions were considered:

- All activities for the extension are contributing to the Project Management Framework (PMF) and either complete current processes (under Annual Work Plan 4 AWP4) or add value to ongoing initiatives
- Key elements, in support of the GAC Feminist International Assistance Policy, are largely related to the Gender & Diversity objectives (outcome 1120 of the initiative), the SGBV research and related follow-up, as well as components related to the technical cooperation with ASEAN
- The implementation of all activities outlined below are to be completed by end of September 2018, except for project finalization costs (final reporting, exit strategy in coordination with other IFRC units, HR demobilizations, etc.) which remain eligible until December 2018.

Budget - The overall project value is CAD 6.45 million, including CAD 6 million from DFATD and CAD 458 thousand from Canadian Red Cross. The project value for IFRC direct implementation (IFRC pledges) is: CAD 6,079,688, including CAD 5,787,838 from DFATD and CAD 191,850 from Canadian Red Cross. The budget for this AWP5 is CAD 650,000 as per the detailed breakdown under section 4.5 below.

¹ Following the first Technical Working Group (TWG) meeting held in Bangkok on 23 June 2014 with the presence of 5 National Societies and all project stakeholders, a decision was made to rename the project into "Regional Resilience Initiative" (RRI) as the acronym "C3R" was being confused with the CSR (Community Safety and Resilience) which is the main programmatic approach under which C3R-RRI is being implemented. The AWP keeps C3R as a reference but some annexes will refer to RRI. Both acronyms should be considered inter-changeable.

2 Initiative & Administrative Management Approach

A bi-lateral Project Cooperation Agreement between the IFRC Asia Pacific Zone office and CRC was finalized and signed in September 2014.

- A first amendment to such agreement entered into force on 30 May 2015 to review the schedule of payments as well as provide additional funding amounting to CAD 100 000 from Canadian Red Cross specifically for activities to be held in Myanmar and Malaysia.
- A second amendment was signed by the parties in June 2016 to extend the timeframe of the project to March 2018 (no cost extension) and adapt reports / payment schedule accordingly.
- Following the signing of the amended contribution agreement between GAC and the Canadian RC on 29 March 2018, CRC and IFRC are in the process of signing a third amendment of the Project Cooperation Agreement (PCA) which expired on 31 March 2018.


2.1 **Project Meetings**

The **Project Steering Committee (PSC)** first met mid-March 2014, to approve the PIP. The second annual PSC was held on 2 March 2015 to approve the first draft of the AWP2. A third PSC meeting on 26 April 2016 approved the AWP3. The fourth PSC meeting on 17 May 2017 in Jakarta (Indonesia) approved the AWP4. The fifth PSC meeting planned for 16 May 2018 in Bangkok (Thailand) will review this draft AWP5.

Despite some recent changes in the project extended team, most RRI technical advisors continue to be based in the IFRC Bangkok Country Cluster Support Team (CCST) which facilitates the coordination among project components. It was not possible to adhere to formal monthly meetings with the busy travel schedule, but *ad hoc* meetings among the extended team members were held more than monthly in the past and this will continue in AWP5. Furthermore, the project tries to encourage joint missions to NSs to promote synergies among the various work plans. Finally, general updates are shared in Bangkok through weekly reports and the weekly Monday staff meeting. Daily email and regular skype communications are exchanged between IFRC and CRC Ottawa manager and technical advisors.

2.2 Project Staff

As of early May 2018, all positions in the project team are filled and the diagram below represents the main CRC and IFRC staffs contributing to the activities.



The IFRC CCST in Bangkok continues to work in an integrated manner with the regional team including: the Jakarta CCST, due to its role in supporting relations with ASEAN, and the National Societies of Indonesia and Timor-Leste. Other country offices in Myanmar and Philippines remain key stakeholders as well, while the Asia-Pacific Regional Office in Kuala Lumpur (Malaysia) and the IFRC Secretariat in Geneva and CRC Headquarters in Ottawa provide overall strategic guidance. Finally, the project indirectly funds support services through the "workstation" system and gets supports in terms of administration, finance, human resources and logistics.

2.3 Risk Update

Risks and mitigation measures remain similar to AWP4. The matrix was slightly updated as part of the AWP4 mid-year and annual reports, but with no change in the qualification of the risks.


3 Initiative Implementation

3.1 Key milestones

RRI endline study

The RRI project team finalized in March 2018 a 9-month endline study process, comprising of various mutually reinforcing data collection and analysis tools such as (1) extensive documentation review of all project files (2) documentation of 16 stories of change, (3) key informant interviews conducted between October and December 2017 (4) Theory of Change workshop covering the G&D outcome of the RRI conducted in November 2017,as well as (5) the final lessons learnt workshop held in February 2018. The endline study report was approved on 3 April 2018 and was shared with GAC. A story about the project and the final workshop is featured in the Resilience Library.


As the project is progressing, NSs continue to demonstrate strong ownership for the project activities. Their initiative and engagement reflect how the project adds value to their domestic priorities, as well as positioning with national authorities and other key DRR stakeholders. The below paragraphs, extracted from the IFRC fourth annual report submitted to Canadian RC late April 2018, provide some highlights under each of the three outcomes of the initiative.



The RRI supports NSs in building evidence of the quality of their work through publications, social media support, knowledge management services, etc. During the reporting period, a focus was made on capturing community voices through video production in five countries, with two other countries (Viet Nam and Timor-Leste) also producing more institutional videos promoting their work including gender mainstreaming in communities. Other initiatives also continued such as the radio programming enhancement in Lao PDR and ongoing technical support related to community engagement and accountability (CEA) in various countries (including a regional CEA forum co-hosted in Bangkok in May 2017 together with the ICRC).

This is coupled with a series of targeted supports that have contributed to enhancing the IFRC and NS relationships with governments, through events, joint meetings, joint participation in regional forums, etc. The disaster law component of the project saw great progress in Cambodia, Lao PDR (despite institutional

changes – separation of disaster management law from climate change law), Viet Nam, Indonesia, and the Philippines. Furthermore, the ACDM approved in April 2017 the IFRC concept note on DL peer to peer platform and <u>AADMER institutionalization mapping</u>, which paved the way for greater engagement at regional level.



Two regional events / trainings were successfully held during the AWP4: (1) the <u>G&D in VCA field school</u> (May 2017), in which a GAC gender specialist also participated, and (2) the annual <u>G&D regional network meeting</u>, with its attached regional <u>training on Sexual and Gender-Based Violence</u> (SGBV – August 2017). At country level, the core group of G&D focal points are leading the institutional change from within their NSs while supporting each other through the established regional network. This included mostly policy development work (G&D policies endorsed in <u>Timor-Leste</u> in April 2017 and in <u>Cambodia</u> in February 2017) as well as research in Lao PDR and Indonesia, as part of the

SGBV research endorsed by ACDM in April 2017². G&D Trainings were also held in Viet Nam, Myanmar and Cambodia at the end of 2017. Beyond the activities, the year 2017 also saw an enhanced partnership of the NSs with Ministries of Women, in particular in Cambodia with joint implementation of a campaign during the 16 days of activism against gender-based violence, as well as Lao PDR with the involvement of the National Commission for the Advancement of Women in the research on the attention to SGBV prevention in disasters. Early May 2018, the ASEAN consultation workshop not only involved members from ACDM but also the ASEAN Committee on Women (ACW) and the ASEAN Commission for the Promotion of the rights of Women and Children (ACWC).



With many regional events held during the AWP4, there were ample opportunities for peer to peer learning and increased cooperation between NSs in Southeast Asia (both at SEA level and along the Mekong River with the Lao-Thai contingency planning exercise), as well as with ASEAN and other stakeholders (UN-Women, ADPC, UNOCHA, UNDP, UNESCAP, etc.). Related to the engagement with ASEAN, three main projects were endorsed by ACDM in April 2017 (SGBV research, DL mapping, and ADDM celebration) which were all completed in December 2017. The IFRC deepened the engagement with the Lao Government (Ministry of Labor and Social Welfare) as Chair of ACDM in 2017 which yielded very positive results in terms of access to decision-

making processes and opportunity for technical influence at regional level. Strategic discussions were held with the AHA Centre, while ongoing cooperation happened in the continuation of previous years around the <u>ACE programme</u> and the synchronization of regional response tools such as ERAT and RDRT. Finally, on the political level, the ASEAN-IFRC MoU was validated at the ACDM meeting in Luang Prabang in October 2017 and mentioned as part of the Chairman Statement³ at the 31st ASEAN Summit in Manila on 13 November 2017.

3.2 Updated Gender Equality Strategy

Throughout the project implementation, the gender and diversity analysis and strategy was updated and deepened based on scoping missions, progress and priorities of the National Societies, coordination with other actors and compilation of key technical documents. The RRI continues to implement the strategy over the past four workplans and it has been updated for this extended period based on the current context and ongoing analysis. The two major areas of focus under AWP5 are outlined below:

- One key strategy that RRI has been strongly advocating for in the past two years and came to fruition in AWP4 is to provide an evidence base to ASEAN Member States and National Societies on SGBV in communities during times of disaster, as well as providing recommendations and supporting the adaption of tools, guidelines and approaches for the prevention and response of SGBV. This culminated in the <u>ASEAN consultation meeting</u> on the research early May 2018 and will be a key focus of the AWP5.
- A new area of focus under AWP5 is women leadership in Disaster Management, with preliminary discussions already held with AHA Centre as well as some GiHA network members.

3.3 Updated Environmental Strategy

There are no changes from the PIP, Section 3.5 (supported by Annex J).

4 Work Breakdown Structure: fifth year (April – December 2018)

Work Package (WP) 1000: Reduced vulnerability to natural disasters for vulnerable communities in Southeast Asia (SEA), with emphasis on women, boys and girls

To achieve WP 1000, C3R Project will continue to pursue a tri-focused approach through two Intermediate and three Immediate Outcomes and Work Packages (WP):

1100: Improved representation of community Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) issues in national policies, plans, and programs

- WP 1110 builds the capacities of National Societies, as well as their national government partners, to understand, harness and communicate community DRR concerns through sound evidencedbased advocacy messages and concrete activities, nationally (and regionally), including disaster law development.
- **WP 1120** builds the capacities of National Societies to apply, advocate for and model the application of a gender lens, and

1200: Increased effectiveness of SEA regional DRR cooperation mechanisms that address the needs of vulnerable communities with emphasis on women, boys & girls

 WP 1210 builds regional collaborations among National Societies and produce evidenced-based reports to strengthen their regional engagements, which will ultimately increase the credibility and reputation of National Societies furthering their integration into regional decision-making bodies, where they can further represent and advance the concerns of vulnerable communities (WPs 1110 and 1120).

The below table presents planned activities with indicative budget amounts and timeframes, organized per immediate outcome and outputs and grouped around the key areas of work included in the AWP4 on which this final work plan builds. Where applicable, the sections also describe both regional / ASEAN activities and country-level activities.
