### Nearly a century of humanitarian action

- IFRC was founded in 1919 as the League of Red Cross Societies to support National Red Cross Societies to improve the health of people in countries affected by the First World War.
- In 1991, the League of Red Cross Societies became the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies.






## A membership organization

- 190 Red Cross or Red Crescent National Societies (and Marshall Islands Red Cross Society)
- A secretariat that provides support to and linkages between our member National Societies
- International coordination services in response to large-scale disasters and health emergencies
- International representation, resource mobilization and humanitarian diplomacy





### Local impact, global reach

- 190 National Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (plus Marshall Islands Red Cross Society)
- Around 17 million active volunteers depending on the year
- 80 million members
- Reaching more than 160 million people every year
- Combined income/expenditure about 31 billion Swiss francs






## **National Societies**


