

### IFRC Statement at the ASEAN Conference on School Safety / Bangkok / February 2017

Excellences, Colleagues, Ladies and gentlemen.

At the outset, please allow me to congratulate ASEAN Member States and partners on the success of the 2<sup>nd</sup> ASEAN Conference on School Safety. Thanks to the warm hospitality of Thailand and DDPM, thanks to the consortium leadership and to all the participants. And if you allow me to extend special thank you to the youth participants at this conference.

We have heard from the participants how disasters impact the education sector, youth and children in the ASEAN region. And how disasters wipe out decades of development gains.

The world leaders have endorsed an ambitious global agenda, including the SDGs, the Sendai Framework and the Paris Agreement on Climate Change. Within these commitments, our leaders have recognized that in order to end poverty and hunger, and in order to provide decent work, health, water and sanitation, education and health y environment, we need to build the resilience of communities and essential infrastructures. World leaders also recognized the critical need to be prepared and resilient in facing disasters including in the education sector.

Our network of the 10 National Societies in the ASEAN countries, with their branches covering every district and every locality, and their committed 4.6 million youth volunteers who are there before, during and after disasters, are committed to scale up action in support of ASEAN and ASEAN school safety goals.

We are very honored to make two concrete commitments at this conference:

1. To strengthen and broaden the engagement our youth and volunteers and scale up our school safety activities to more schools and more children at risk.
2. We are encouraged by the partnership and the joint work we have been doing with the ASSI Consortium, and would like to institutionalize that partnership around ASSI as an inclusive and long-term program approach.

We look forward to taking this important initiative to new levels and to reach together to more schools and more children. Building safe and resilient schools is a corner stone of building resilient communities.
