



1864

The first Geneva Convention, makes reference to services "in times of epidemics, or of disasters such as floods, fires or other natural catastrophes", and other services as agreed.



What does that mean?

- Support and supplement the public authorities in their humanitarian tasks, through
 - close coordination,
- consider any official requests by the authorities
- Public authorities
 - ensure that National Societies can operate autonomously and
 - in line with the Movement's Fundamental Principles.
