INTRODUCTION



The world continues to reel from the impact of novel coronavirus that has put unprecedented stress on the most advanced health-care systems and extreme strain on major economies and financial markets. As many as 500,000 people have lost their lives to COVID-19 worldwide and the confirmed cases have surpassed 10 million, as per the latest figures. With the Asia-Pacific region being home to 60 per cent of the world's population – i.e. some 4.3 billion people – an uncontrolled outbreak could be devastating.

To contain the spread of COVID-19, the countries in the Asia-Pacific are grappling with some hard choices between carefully reopening the economies and addressing the public health concerns, especially since the fear of a second wave looms large. Unlike a few countries outside the region that have been able to control the spread of COVID-19, those in South Asia continue to face a worrying situation. Some of them have an already compromised public health-care system, overcrowded detention facilities, densely populated camps of displaced populations and informal settlements, adding layers of vulnerability for populations already facing immense challenges. Additionally, the socioeconomic impact of COVID-19 on populations has been massive and appears likely to worsen over time.

With a well-coordinated and well-resourced response mechanism involving national and international actors,

the impact can be contained. The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) is appealing for USD 1.24 billion to support its global response to COVID-19 and its immediate and long-term impact.

Our response

Like elsewhere, in the Asia-Pacific region, the ICRC has joined the massive efforts being carried out by governments, international community and humanitarian organizations to fight the spread of novel coronavirus. We have massively adjusted, and where relevant, launched new initiatives to support national authorities, health-care facilities, places of detention and local Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies to respond to the pandemic.

Our operational response to COVID-19 in the region focuses on four main areas:

- Public health response
- Infection-control in detention facilities
- Humanitarian forensics (management of the dead)
- Support to National Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies

In the following pages, you will see a country-wise overview of the ICRC operational response so far to COVID-19 in the ASEAN Member States.


PARTNERING WITH NATIONAL SOCIETIES


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WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION (WHO) STATISTICS ON COVID-19 FOR THE ASEAN MEMBER STATES



OPERATIONAL ORIENTATION

 The past month has been characterized by a gradual transition from emergency COVID-19 response to resumption of protection and assistance activities in the conflict-affected areas of the country. The difficulties being experienced by people in conflict-affected areas are compounded by COVID-19 health concerns. In key areas of operation in Mindanao, the ICRC (in many instances, in coordination with authorities who have the main responsibility to provide assistance) strives to look into and alleviate the situation of people affected, as may be gleaned from the range of activities in this report.

RELATED ACTIVITIES

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Davao, Zamboanga, Cotabato and Iligan: To support their livelihood, cash amounting to 24,000 Swiss francs (Sfr) was transferred to 116 families of missing people and 198 families with people with disabilities (in partnership with the Davao Jubilee Foundation).

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- Protection of civilian population: Continuous dialogue with parties to the armed conflict on the health situation
 and relevant provisions of IHL applicable to COVID-19 pandemic has been on. To promote compliance with IHL and
 humanitarian norms, we have sent 11 letters with recommendations to parties to the conflict. We are regularly
 monitoring the conflict-affected areas to assess the situation with regards the safety of civilians and healthcare workers. We are also observing the situation with respect to the conflict-affected populations to determine if they
 have received government assistance such as cash and relief food items, and if they have access to farms and markets.
- Regular liaison with the Inter-Agency Task Force (IATF) and their Civil-Military Operations Control Centre (CMOCC). Contacts, information and advice / recommendations shared as needed, ICRC movements notified in enhanced community quarantine areas and channels to CMOCC kept open in case use of military (air) assets as a last resort are needed for the ICRC activities.
- Re-establishing family links to help detainees stay connected with their families; 68 tablets devices with prepaid data distributed in 15 detention facilities and seven isolation centres.
- Completed the registration and pay-out to 1,032 households of UCG project for conflict-affected communities in the municipalities of Ampatuan and Datu Hoffer, Maguindanao. Each household received approximately Sfr 94 to help cover their immediate needs.
- Donated sets of half-month food ration to 115 IDPs in two villages in Gingoog City, with PRC-Gingoog Chapter, Misamis Oriental.
- Delivered corn mill spare parts to Barangay Diatagon, Lianga, Surigao Del Sur, to allow the mill's full operation, which will also benefit nine neighboring sub-villages repeatedly displaced by armed conflict.


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- Donated 992 sets of half-month food ration to PRC-Kidapawan Chapter for distribution to households that continue to be displaced from conflict-affected communities in Pikit, North Cotabato.
- Donated two-month chlorine and fuel supply to Marawi City Water District to cater to 8,000 residents and 10,500 displaced people living in Marawi.
- Awareness-generation messages spread via SMS in five languages and social media posts, reaching over 200,550 people.
- **Community engagement:** Reaching out to past and planned beneficiaries of food, household items and cash grants, reassuring that though postponed, the projects have not been shelved.
- Promoting mental health: Info-as-aid messages in Tagalog promoting mental health awareness disseminated via social and audio-visual media.
- Constant dialogue with police authorities, coordinating donation of items in overcrowded police stations. So far, 20 police stations have received ICRC support.
- Our unit in charge of relations with weapon bearers in the Philippines are working on the long-term plan to assist the
 Philippine military with their modernization, which includes integrating IHL into military processes Transformation
 Roadmap set for completion by 2028.
- A webinar on "Management of the dead and Islamic burial at times of COVID-19" was jointly organized by the BARMM, Institute of Islamic Studies of University of the Philippines and the ICRC. As many as 65 participants, including health and other government officials from BARMM, scholars, religious leaders and humanitarian workers, shared their insights on the topic.
- Translation of COVID-19 information posters: Info-as-aid posters were translated for detainees into the following languages - Chinese, Korean, Japanese and Vietnamese. These serve the informational needs of over 300 foreign detainees in the Bureau of Immigration (BI).



INFECTION-CONTROL IN DETENTION FACILITIES

- Standard Operating Procedures for the prevention and control of COVID-19 in places of detention shared with the Prisons Departments and technical advice extended to the prison authorities for management of detainees in context of COVID-19
- Five training sessions on disinfection organized in prisons, 989 posters distributed
- 882 released detainees supported with food, blankets, hygiene material and other essentials in 16 quarantine sites in Rakhine state. This included 31 cases of family reunification
- Bars of soap donated to Insein, Monhyin and Mandalay, benefiting 30,000 people

- Disinfection work was carried out in six prisons (Insein, Mandalay, Lashio, Myitkyina, Sittwe and Maungdaw), benefiting close to **294,000 detainees**
- 60,000 COVID-19 posters from Ministry of Health and Sports delivered to the Prisons Department for distribution in prisons
- 30 solar kits donated to 25 health facilities and quarantine centres run by the Ministry of Health and Sports in northern areas of Rakhine state
- 5,766 people reached through technical and material upgrades of eight quarantine centres run by township, district and state authorities in Kachin, Shan and Rakhine states
- Materials for 50,000 cloth masks donated to prisons in Insein, Mandalay, Sittwe and Lashio

6,000 Red Cross identification aprons produced by MRCS with support from the ICRC for use with personal COVID-19 protective equipment and to reduce potential contamination of uniforms



5,000 volunteers provided with waistcoats and protective helmets



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3,600 MRCS staff and volunteers provided with COVID-19 insurance coverage and specialized training on the use of COVID-19 PPE and masks



In three states (Kachin, Rakhine and Shan), MRCS local branches were supported with face shields, surgical masks, protective goggles, latex gloves, contactless thermometers, hand gel disinfectant for the staff and volunteers working in community prevention, quarantine centres or involved in COVID-19 screening



Seven National Red Cross Societies including American, Danish, Finnish, German, Norwegian, Swedish and Turkish Red Crescent, together with the International Federation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies and the ICRC, mobilized to support the MRCS' COVID-19 response

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OPERATIONAL ORIENTATION

- We have adapted our humanitarian response across the country to the new realities of COVID-19 while keeping our robust operations for victims of different armed conflicts and other situations of violence.
- We are maintaining essential operations in Kachin, Rakhine and Shan states, while maximizing prevention efforts for COVID-19 together with the Myanmar Red Cross Society and to support the Ministry of Health and Sports.

RELATED ACTIVITIES


- At least **2,500 people** across Myanmar supported by the "Safe Return Home" programme after release from detention under the annual Presidential Pardon. They also received information on ways to prevent COVID-19.
- 53,650 people from Kachin and Rakhine states assisted with non-surgical masks in respose to COVID-19.
- 287 tailors in IDP camps at Kachin and Rakhine benefited from payments for production of non-surgical masks.
- As many as 600 people in quarantine facilities in Myitkyina, Kachin state and Rakhine state received phone cards to stay in touch with family members and loved ones during their quarantine period.
- Over 26,500 Facebook users reached with an #InfoAsAid digital messaging focusing on hygiene promotion and COVID-19 prevention.
- Containing information approved by the Ministry of Health and Sport, 65,000 posters shared with communities in Kachin, Rakhine and Shan states.
- An advocacy note on "IHL and COVID-19" shared with civilian and military authorities, ethnic armed organizations and other stakeholders.
- ICRC guidelines on dead body management in context of COVID-19 prepared for armed and security forces of Myanmar.
- Recommendation on risk and prevention measures related to law enforcement operations were shared with Myanmar Police Force.

THAI RED CROSS SOCIETY

- Working with the Thai Red Cross Society (TRC), the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) and the Migrant Working Group (MWG) on promoting awareness and preventive measures related to COVID-19 among the migrant communities in Thailand:
 - Info-as-aid 25,000 posters (10,000 each in Burmese and Khmer and 5,000 in Vietnamese) & 150,000 leaflets (80,000 in Burmese, 50,000 in Khmer and 20,000 in Vietnamese)
 - Dubbing and subtitling of ICRC video on stigmatization into six languages - Thai, Khmer, Burmese, Vietnamese, Laotian and Bahasa Melayu
- Financial support of 12,785 Swiss francs (Sfr) provided to TRC provincial chapters in the South of Thailand:

OPERATIONAL ORIENTATION

• Our **multidisciplinary response** aims to address the immediate humanitarian needs as well as long-term structural impacts of COVID-19 crisis, focusing on protection, including detention, health and water activities.

RELATED ACTIVITIES

- In quarantine centres in the South of Thailand (Pattani, Narathiwat, Yala and Songkhla), we distributed relief items worth Sfr 79,082, benefiting 1,950 people. The items included 1,950 bedding sets (mattress, pillow, pillow cover and blanket), basic hygiene material (toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, shampoo, mosquito repellent, etc.), snacks, 50 electric fans and 37 water boilers.
- Under the framework of three ICRC multidisciplinary visits carried out with DGP officials from Health Rapid Response Unit, Construction & Maintenance Office and Operations and Administration Departments, hygiene items were distributed to more than **2,500 juveniles, women and accompanying children** in three places of detention housing more than half of the country's vulnerable detainees among the total 6,000 prison population.
- 1,000 "Safe phone calls" posters (COVID-19 context specific) co-designed by the ICRC and DGP were published and distributed to all places of detention for the benefit of 40,000 detainees and 4,000 prison staff.
- As many as 10,000 pre-printed RCMs / "Family News Form" co-developed with the CRC and printed for future use interchangeably with the RCMs in the framework of ICRC-CRC RFL services in prisons. This is crucial due to re-introduction of the blanket ban on phone services in prisons as of mid-August 2020.

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
- In five provinces of Viet Nam (Quang Ngai, Da Nang, Bing Dinh, Binh Phuoc and Can Tho), we provided **food** assistance to 500 people with disabilities.
- Communication products, animation videos and campaign were run with partners of the International Movement
 of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies to tackle Mental Health and Psychological Support (MHPSS) needs
 of populations as well as to address the issue of stigmatization.
- A media campaign focused on COVID-19 in detention settings, and calling for support to tackle the issue, was launched in Cambodia.
- Donation of **50,000 masks** to the Royal Thai Police for officers involved directly in COVID-19 response operations.
- Analysis of restrictive measures and legal policies in Thailand, Cambodia, Laos and Viet Nam.
- Donation of food items and hygiene materials to 44 members of the Battambang and Kampong Speu Wheelchair Basketball teams.
- Presentations on hygiene measures, patient screening and disinfection done for staff of physiotherapy departments
 of five referral hospitals, namely Siem Reap, Svay Rieng, Trorlach, Banteay Meanchey and Korng Pisey.

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



OPERATIONAL ORIENTATION

- Due to the unprecedented challenge created by COVID-19, the Jakarta delegation has reallocated 65% of its budget to pandemic response.
- As the spread of COVID-19 is yet to show any signs of slowing down, we have widened our support to include different Indonesian institutions. While the initial plans were to support prisons in three provinces and 25 hospitals, during the first semester of 2020, we distributed PPE, hygiene and health items to 75 detention centres, 26 hospital facilities, 14 police stations and two Islamic boarding schools in Indonesia. The plan is to keep up the distribution during the coming weeks.

RELATED ACTIVITIES

- We are reaching out to our network of academics, religious and community leaders to pass appropriate messages of prevention that are adapted to specific audiences. We are also approaching various embassies to explore potential collaborations.
- As part of a refresher series, webinars on "management of the dead during pandemics" are being organized for volunteers and first responders from faith-based organizations. The delegation recently participated in a discussion organized by Keluarga Buddhayana Indonesia, a Buddhist community.
- We are working with the PMI on COVID-19 related communication programmes that could reach wider audience through various mediums.







• **Malaysia:** Extended technical advice on health care in detention to authorities and continued to engage with them in a bilateral dialogue on other areas of support.

RELATED ACTIVITIES

- Continued engagement with other humanitarian organizations via participation in a Risk Communication & Community Engagement Working Group (RCCE-WG). Commissioned by the MoH via the WHO, the RCCE-WG was formed among key humanitarian actors in the country at the peak of the pandemic. It continues to hold bi-weekly meetings and serves as an information exchange and coordination platform to encourage collaboration and remove duplication of efforts.
- Delivered a lecture to the armed forces and police personnel on the "Military Involvement in Security Operations in COVID-19 Response" at the Malaysian Armed Forces Staff College as part of the Command and Staff Diploma Course.
- Successfully organized a three-day Maritime in Security Operation seminar with the Centre for Military and International Humanitarian Law. The theme of the seminar was "COVID-19: Balancing Border Security Needs with Humanitarian Concerns". As many as 58 participants from enforcement agencies, academic institutions and international organizations attended the seminar.
- Playing an advisory role to the Joint HQ Police and Military during the Movement Control Order. Weekly meetings being organized.
- Playing an advisory role to the National Security Council on humanitarian concerns in the development of SOPs. Daily virtual meetings being organized.
