Background

☐ The First Aid Network brings together Red Cross and Red Crescent (RCRC) representatives from South-East Asia (SEA), IFRC and ICRC to discuss collectively supporting to achieve the First Aid Vision 2030. This network was formed as a decision from the 19th Southeast Asia Leaders meeting, hosted by Brunei Darussalam Red Crescent Society in Bandar Seri Begawan in 2022, which also agreed on Brunei Darussalam Red Crescent Society as the first chair of the network.

☐ The decision included a commitment by all leaders to invest in development of Southeast Asia National Societies capacity and resources in First Aid through peer-topeer learning and support as well as scaling up Southeast Asia National Societies capacity in community first aid and continuing to invest in the development of commercial first aid, including utilizing digital platforms.





Resolution 1.

Strengthening the Southeast Asia First Aid Network (SEAFAN)

- Commit to sustaining the SEA First Aid Network, promoting collaboration driving knowledge exchange and collective growth, and enhancing first aid capabilities among National Societies across
- Southeast Asia with support from IFRC, GFARC, and the Asia Pacific MHPSS Collaborative.
- Aim to have at least two dedicated focal points from each National Society representing the Southeast Asia First Aid Network.
- Commit to exploring and securing diverse resources and partnerships, including government and private sector engagement, to sustain the network across Southeast Asia.











































Resolution 2. First Aid Capacity Building and Training


- Implement joint first aid initiatives across Southeast Asia with support from National Societies, GFARC, IFRC, and the AP MHPSS Collaborative.
- Promote collaboration between National Societies to develop a unified First Aid training standard, including Physical and Psychological First Aid.
- Adopt the "Orientation to Psychological First Aid (PFA) module" developed by the IFRC Reference Centre for Psychosocial Support into the First Aid module and curriculum.
- AP MHPSS Collaborative would provide the technical input to conduct the Training of Trainers for First Aid trainers to facilitate the "Orientation to Psychological First Aid (PFA) module".
- Expand a regional roster of First Aid Master Educators to enhance collaboration, capacities and expertise across Southeast Asia.
- Customize and contextualize First Aid training program with target broader populations to meet the specific needs, including schools, police forces, disability, industries and cross-border collaboration.

















































Resolution 3. Commercialization of Physical and Psychological First Aid

- Philippine RC and Singapore RC will conduct workshop on commercial first aid to improve business strategies across National Societies, while Myanmar RC will share their experience National Societies investment alliances program supported by IFRC and ICRC.
- Promote sharing of learning and promotional materials for Commercial First Aid's marketing tools through a shared platform, tailored to each country's context.
















































Resolution 4. Digitalization and Innovation of First Aid Program

- Promote innovative approaches of First Aid from different context in the National Societies.






























Resolution 5. Advocacy and Policy Development for First Aid Program
