- Establish and launch the Southeast Asia First Aid Excellence Centre as a first aid (physical first aid and psychological first aid) knowledge hub for National Societies within the Southeast Asia region.
 This Excellent Centre embodies the peer-to-peer learning network, facilitating dynamic knowledge exchange, innovation dissemination, and collective lessons learned around first aid practices, all tailored to the unique contexts of the Southeast Asia region.
- Agree that the Southeast Asia First Aid Excellent Centre is physically and virtually hosted by the Brunei Darussalam Red Crescent Society.


